Through honoring and cherishing each child as an individual, Tamarack Waldorf School works to achieve academic excellence and social harmony. We offer




### milwaukee parental choice program

Tamarack is a private, nonprofit school that participates in the Milwaukee Parental Choice Program (MPCP). Also called the "Choice" program, MPCP is considered the nation's first modern private school Choice program. It offers private school vouchers to low-income Milwaukee students, an average value of \$7,366.

MPCP helps students from low-income families to attend any participating private school located in the city at no charge. 26,868 students attended one of 125 different schools with the assistance of the Choice program in 2014-15. Valuing diversity, nearly 80% of Tamarack's students attend school as part of the Choice program.

The program started in 1990 as a model proposal to deal with Milwaukee's educational crisis and slowly gained popularity. The program opens educational opportunities for Milwaukee children, helping increase high school graduation rates.







# a message from the administrator, jean kacanek

Recently, I was asked to write a very short message as to why I support Tamarack with my own personal financial contributions. My statement was, "Our students love our school."

I observe this in many ways in my work with, and among them. Every year, we have a Grandparents and Special Friends Day. During the student sharing of some of their work last March, I asked the 7th

grade students to share with the audience what they, as young adolescents, find special about our school that is different than their friends' experiences in other schools. Thirteen students spoke and each response was genuine, extremely heart-warming and individually unique. This is a sampling: "It is as if we are all a family." "I love my teacher, my teacher since 2nd grade. She really cares about me." "We've had new students join the class and they quickly become a part of the group." "My best friends are my classmates." "I really have time to focus on, and do good work in my main lesson book." "It's cool to carve wood and to make things in woodworking class." "I love to sing and make music with my friends." Hearing comments like these frequently in a variety of contexts is one of the rewards of my job!

The faculty, who carefully nurture the learning environment of the classroom, are responsible for helping make this all come to be. Some of the words I can use to describe our faculty are dedicated, inspired, caring, talented and giving.

The parents who choose Tamarack Waldorf School for their children's education often go way above and beyond to support the work of each class of students and the work of the whole school. Many parents not only volunteer to support students in the classroom, but lend their professional and personnel expertise to the Board of Trustees and Advisory Board.

My fellow administrators work every day to serve the needs of the whole community. It takes the whole community's involvement to make Tamarack Waldorf School the vibrant school it is today, growing quickly toward the future when we will have a school offering a Waldorf curriculum from Early Childhood through 12th Grade.

# a message from the board of trustees president, ryan hundt

As Tamarack looks ahead to its 20th year of bringing Waldorf education to the greater Milwaukee area, I'd like to take this opportunity to share with you some of the exciting things happening in our school community.

The 2014-15 academic year saw the completion of a strategic planning process facilitated by a generous grant from the Mid-States Shared Gifting Program. Created with input from the entire community, the completed plan outlines initiatives the school will undertake in order to better serve both our families and our staff.

While the strategic plan tasks inform how Tamarack will shape its future, our faculty, staff and board are also currently working to guide the school's continued growth. Having established a 9th grade class, Tamarack's student population is approaching 300, with an annual budget of \$2 million. Our responsibilities to our mission have never been greater, and will continue to grow as we look to expand into the 10th, 11th, and 12th grades. Our first high school class will graduate in June of 2018, the culmination of years of effort on the part of the Tamarack community to do something unique—provide broad-based access to Waldorf education to students of all ages in the Greater Milwaukee area.

Crucial to our efforts is the process of re-accreditation from our accrediting organization, the Associated Waldorf Schools of North America, which will occur in 2016-17. The accreditation certifies that we are living up to our shared principles and the meticulousness and care embodied in the Waldorf curriculum.

Finally, I want to mention the most important element I have learned in my time on the board at Tamarack: while state funding continues to be an important component of our budget, private financial support is critical to success and will only become more critical as we seek to expand our educational offerings.

On behalf of the Board of Trustees, I would like to thank everyone for their tireless support of the school and for the generous financial support of your gifts and pledges to an institution that fosters academic excellence and social harmony through Waldorf education. For that, we are very grateful.

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# 2014-2015 accomplishments

Tamarack Waldorf High School (TWHS) opened with 22 Grade 9 students.

We had waiting lists in our K4, K5, 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup>, 4<sup>th</sup>, & 5<sup>th</sup> grades.

We undertook strategic planning to help guide the school over the next 3-5 years. It was completed in summer 2015.

Tamarack partnered with First Stage Theater. 24 students received scholarships to attend First Stage programming.

Waldorf leaders Patrick Stolfo and Michael D'Aleo visited TWHS. They worked directly with Grade 9 students and spoke to our community about the critical role of arts in education for adolescents and intuition and innovation.

Grades 4-8 displayed their artwork at Riverwest Co-op.

Grade 3 teamed up with the City of Milwaukee Forestry Department, planting trees at Pulaski Park & along the Milwaukee River.

We hosted a Governance Conference with keynote speaker Torin Finser. More than 60 people attended, coming from 7 regional Waldorf schools.

TWHS received \$7,000 for art thanks to Arte Para Todos. Meaning "Art for everyone," the 3-day music festival featured 70 bands and 15 artists in 15 venues across the city.

Grade 3-8 crocheted hats for a local homeless shelter.



#### tamarack specialty programs

#### woodwork

Learning through doing and learning through making are twin aspects of the same fundamental attitude to education that is ingrained in the Waldorf curriculum. Woodworking helps develop focus, creativity, perseverance, and skillfulness of eye and hand. Throughout, the teacher attempts to awaken an appreciation for the combination of usefulness and beauty.

Woodwork begins in fifth grade when students use hand tools to give wood form and function. Students then move on to concave shapes like spoons. By eighth grade, students are creating their own drum. The work in grade eight helps develop endurance and confidence in preparation for High School, as students are introduced to power tools in ninth grade.





#### music

Music is an essential part of the Waldorf curriculum and permeates the school day from kindergarten through High School. The importance is not how well a student plays, but rather the simultaneous engagement of senses, muscles, and intellect, enhancing the process of learning.

Tamarack students begin playing the pentatonic flute in grade one, progressing to the diatonic flute in grade three. In grade four, students begin playing violin, and in grade six they can choose any instrument Tamarack offers. By High School, students are participating in advanced-level chorus and instrumental music.

Through the study of music, we learn to sensitize our hearing, allowing us to better listen to the sounds of the world and to each other.

#### handwork

As human beings, we use our hands regularly in our daily lives. Handwork supports the development of hand-eye coordination, manual dexterity, basic math skills such as counting and geometry, follow a process from concept to completion and the ability to realize a two-dimensional design in three dimensions, which is a useful lifelong skill.

In the early elementary grades, all students learn to knit, crochet, sew by hand, and embroider. In sixth grades, students make 3-dimensional stuffed elephants, and in seventh grade learn to work with leather by making moccasins. Handwork culminates with the use of an electric sewing machine in eighth grade. Throughout the grades, projects are of a practical nature: scarves, hats, bags, toys and other articles of clothing. All work is done with an appreciation for and development of aesthetic qualities.



# tamarack parent association—community circle (tpa-cc)

Tamarack Parent Association – Community Circle (TPA-CC) is a wonderfully diverse and energetic group of parents who share the common goal of wanting excellent Waldorf education for their children. Tamarack parents help our school with heartfelt energy, vast quantities of time, and array of talents, assisting in a variety of ways with the running of the school. TPA-CC serves the school and parent interests throughout the year, and provides for the school through fundraising and volunteerism.

Funds raised from weekly bagel sales, Brady Street BID #11 street events, the Smoothie Social, Winter Fair and Revels of Spring Benefit Party enhance school life and education for Tamarack students. With raised funds, TPA-CC purchased every Tamarack child a student membership from the Urban Ecology Center (UEC). The UEC membership is one of the proudest aspects of TPA-CC, providing immeasurable opportunities for educational growth for our children.

Tamarack's parent body truly helps shape the cultural life of the school. From supporting teacher's work to committee participation, there are countless ways for Tamarack parents to get involved, and lend their experience and gifts to the leaders of tomorrow.

We endeavor to include input from as many parents as possible and use class leaders to facilitate communication. TPA-CC holds open meetings monthly to discuss school business and the issues of parents and families. Every Tamarack parent is a member of TPA-CC.



### a message from tpa-cc chair, stephanie schrader-lawson

2014-15 was an energetic and positive year for TPA-CC. It started with a change in leadership roles. I stepped into the chair position, and mid-way through the year, Michael Roberts joined me as co-chair. We also had many new parents jump into active roles. They, along with veteran families, were a great help in formalizing TPA-CC operations and events.

Once again, we organized fundraising events to sustain student membership to the Urban Ecology Center, while also supporting the school as a whole. This includes fundraising events such as the Smoothie Social, Winter Fair, Revels of Spring Benefit Party, and Brady Street Festivals. We also focused on friend-raisers and school collaborations by assisting the Michaelmas and May Festivals, and Brady Street Art Festival.
